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DIGITAL CITIZENSHIP - PART I



Course Overview

Students in Elementary Digital Citizenship – Part I will explore ways to become a good digital citizen in today's world. In each unit students will be introduced to various digital citizenship elements: Digital Literacy, Digital Access, Digital Rights and Responsibilities, and most importantly Digital Safety. Throughout this course students will have opportunities to watch videos and complete activities. To watch a video, just click on it. A number of links will have printable documents pertaining to the unit, which are in a PDF format and ready for printing. Some units will have games for you to play and practice the skill or understand the information. Each unit will have questions for you to answer so you can demonstrate your learning. The course is aligned with national standards for technology and curriculum. If you should have trouble with the material at any time, please talk to your parents or teacher.

In this course you will:

- recognize how to participate properly with technology,
- realize how to protect yourself online,
- improve your technology skills,
- be ready for the challenges in future jobs, and
- build skills for lifelong learning

Unit Overview

Welcome to Elementary Digital Citizenship – Part I! Everywhere you look you see computers and technology! People use computers and technology for all kinds of activities. Computers and technology can be used for work. You can use a computer to type a letter to a boss. Computers and



technology can be used to calculate and store information. When your parents get money from a bank machine, a computer keeps track of the money. Computers can be used for fun too. You can play games on computers. Smartphones, desktops, laptops, and tablets are all computers and called digital devices. Technology often means the Internet and technical ways of doing things.

When you have completed this unit, you will:





- learn why you should be a good digital citizen,
- discover what make up digital citizenship,
- find out the rules to be a good digital citizen, and
- pledge to be a good digital citizen.

Digital Citizenship

We live and play in a **digital** world. A **digital citizen** is someone who uses computers and technology. Computers, technology, and the Internet give you lots of cool things to do. But, it can be dangerous too. How we act and behave in this digital world is not always clear.



When using computers and technology, a good digital citizen:

- acts and behaves responsibly,
- is respectfully to others,
- stays safe and out of trouble, and
- knows good digital citizenship.

Good Digital Citizenship

A good **digital citizen** means that you act properly online when using the Internet. The following rules will guide you toward good digital citizenship. You should:

- 1. Be polite and courteous at all times and treat others online the way that you would want to be treated.
- Never be rude or mean online, and immediately tell an adult if something mean or scary happens.
- If you would not do something in real life, you should not do it online.
- Be aware that words may be interpreted differently, so watch what you say.
- Never share your name, school, age, phone number, or address, particularly to strangers, without asking a trusted adult.
- Explore the Internet with your family or ask permission first before visiting a website.
- 7. Never visit inappropriate websites.
- Get help and ask permission when creating a username and password.



Digital citizens often go on the Internet to play games, get information, or communicate with others. When you go online using a laptop, tablet, desktop, smartphone, or gaming console, you should always practice good digital citizenship.

Good digital citizenship follows the same basic rules as good classroom behavior: respect others, act sensibly, be safe, be informed, and obey the law. So, whether you are in the classroom or using digital devices and technology, you should behave properly.
