- 4. **Active voice**: Active voice is a grammatical structure in which the subject of a sentence performs the action of the verb. This makes the sentence more direct, concise, and engaging. For example, "The dog chased the ball."
- 5. **Passive voice**: Passive voice is a grammatical structure in which the object of a sentence is the subject of the sentence and the action is performed upon it by the verb. This often makes the sentence less clear, less engaging, and less direct. For example, "The ball was chased by the dog."
