Sponge Painting

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Sponge painting is a very versatile art activity that can cater to any lesson theme and can be enjoyed by children of all ages.



Materials



- · Craft sponges, kitchen sponges or bath sponges
- · Any water-based paint
- · Plastic plates or trays
- · Paper or fabric
- Scissors

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Safety Tips

Steps



1. You can start out with ready-made craft sponges or you can make your own out of old kitchen or bath sponges. To make your own, gather several old sponges and clean them. Once dry, draw different shapes on each sponge. You can draw one or two shapes per sponge, depending on how big you want the shapes to be.



Cut out the sponge shapes. You can keep the trimmings for the painting part. Use them to print small or fine details such as grass, leaves, or lines.

Put water-based paint like tempera, poster paint, or acrylic paint in plates or small trays. Add some water to make the paint more spreadable but avoid watering down the paint too much.



4. Dip a sponge on paint, making sure that the bottom is evenly-coated with paint.



5. Press the sponge firmly onto paper or fabric.



6. You can fill your picture with fun random shapes.




Or compose a picture using your sponge shapes. You can finger paint the details or use the sponge trimmings to print small images.

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
