Newsela Editor's Note: This essay appeared in the July-August 1845 edition of the United States Magazine and Democratic Review under the title "Annexation." The editor, John O'Sullivan, coined the term "Manifest Destiny." That phrase supported the U.S. taking of western land. It was also in part responsible for the removal of Native Americans from those lands. Its use of language is typical of newspapers of the time.

It is now time to end the fight against the Annexation of Texas. All of the angry conversations about this question must stop. We know it may be a condition of our freedom that we must always be struggling over something that divides our government



parties. But in regard to Texas, the parties have been through enough. It is time for our love of country to win out. If this cannot be done, it is at least time for us to use our common sense, and accept the unavoidable and the unchangeable.

#### **Welcome To The Family**

Texas is now ours. Already, before these words are written, her Congress has ratified our invitation to join the Union and adapted her laws to our national laws. She is no longer to us a geographical space — a certain mix of coast, plain, mountain, valley, forest and stream. She is no longer to us a simple country on the map. She comes within the dear and holy designation of our country.

It is time then that all should stop treating her like a foreigner. We should stop criticizing everything connected with her rise. We should stop opposing the steps necessary for her rise to be completed and dismiss words of unwelcome. There has been enough of all this. It has had its fitting day during the period when it unfortunately became one of the leading topics of party division and presidential campaigning. But that period has passed. With it, let its bigotry and its strong feelings, its disagreements and its denunciations, pass away too.

The next time Congress meets, the representatives of the new young state of Texas will take their places in our halls of national legislation. They will be side by side with those of the original Thirteen Colonies. Let their welcome into "the family" be kindly and cheerful. This befits such an occasion.

### A Right Of Independence

Other nations have wrongly tried to join our talks about Texas. Their goal has been to decrease our power. They seek to limit our greatness and check the fulfillment of our manifest destiny to overspread the continent. The land was allotted by God for the free growth of our people, who multiply by the millions every year.

It is wholly untrue that the annexation was at the expense of justice. The independence of Texas was complete and unconditional. It was an independence, not only in fact, but of right. We never felt a duty toward Mexico to hold back from reclaiming our province. If Texas became populated with Americans, it was by no plan of our government. It was on the express invitation of Mexico herself.

## A Step Closer To California Joining The Union

California probably will be the next to fall away from its loose connection with Mexico. Backward and distracted, Mexico never can exert any real governmental authority over California. The failings of Mexico and the distance of California must make their relationship one of near independence. Only by forbidding immigration and stunting its



growth would Mexico keep control. But then it would be a military state. This is no government in the legitimate sense of the term. In the case of California this is now impossible. The Anglo-Saxon foot is already on its borders.

The French, then, should stop speaking of balances of power on the American Continent. There is no growth in Spanish America! Whatever population growth there might be in the British Canadas, is only for their own early ending of their colonial relationship with far-off Britain, across the Atlantic Ocean. This will soon be followed by annexation.

Up to 300 million Americans are destined to gather beneath the flutter of the stripes and stars, in the quickly approaching year of the Lord 1945!
